EXPLORING COLOUR AND PRINTMAKING IN RECEPTION

It has been a busy first half term for the Reception children; they have been exploring paint and chalk in art lessons. The children have made paint explosions to represent Bonfire Night, painted in the rain to see how colours mix and chalked imaginative pictures as they begin to understand mark making.





In forest sessions they have been learning about nature and have found lots of ways to print. They made paint prints of leaves, printed apples, took leaf rubbings and even used hammers to make leaf and flower prints.





The children have also been using clay on Muddy Mondays and making great representations of hibernating hedgehogs. They had very natural forest needles for spikes!!

The children also have their own gallery in class and love displaying their work. This has helped to develop their sketching skills. We love their Gruffalo drawings. Well done Reception!



THE HUMAN FORM - YEAR THREE

Our Year 3 children have been looking at the work of Leonardo da Vinci's Renaissance style and Jean Michel Basquiat's neo-expressionism style.

They have been comparing their representations of the human form. The artwork they explored became inspiration for the children producing sketchbook work based on the human body. They used pencil, charcoal and graphite to create their own work, not reproductions.

After sketching, they rolled white and back poster paint onto a large piece of sugar paper and discussed how the colours mix. The children then moved the tables to the edge of the room so they could work on the floor. In teams, the children produced large scale versions of their sketches. Their artwork was amazing!

MYTHICAL DRAGON'S YEAR FOUR

Inspired by Year Four's history topic - Greek Myths, the children have completed a wonderful sculpture project based on mythical dragons. They began by drawing a range of eyes in their sketchbooks based on dragon imagery.

They then used sketchbook time to explore different drawing media: pencil work and watercolour painting.





The children decided to make their dragon eye from clay. They used a relief tile to firstly explore the features of clay and then experimented with patterns, shape and form before starting their final sculpture.

The children were confident in thinking of impressive shapes they would like to create and the textures they wanted to add to replicate scales and other aspects of a dragon eye. Take a look, at their final breath-taking pieces.



We are excited to announce that twelve children's artwork was selected to be displayed in an art exhibition at the World of Glass


















The World of Glass exhibition is on until January. Why not visit the gallery, it is fantastic and would be a great day out for any child interested in art?

Poppies produced on the day have been displayed in a beautiful installation in the Infant Forest.






The children have loved viewing this sculpture and have shown a tremendous amount of dignity and respect when they have described it.
